THE PROSPERITY OF OUR REGION	
The economic wealth in an area is based on several key factors:	-
Production and use of goods and services	
Selling goods and services outside of the region	
Purchasing goods and services from outside of the region	
Receipt of money, goods, and services, either as loans or gifts	
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QUALITY OF LIFE	
How is quality of life measured? The United Nations uses a	
number of criteria, including:	
Gross Domestic Product (GDP) per person	
Birth rate	
• Life expectancy	
Literacy (ability to read and write)	
Maintain the environment	
Racial and gender equality	
QUALITY OF LIFE	
• The UN ranks 174 countries on these criteria	
Countries with a lot of industry rank higher	
This gap, called disparity, in quality of life can be enormous

QUALITY OF LIFE The Atlantic Provinces • Some provinces in Canada are richer than others • The wealth gap is called regional disparity, and based on GDP per capita • Why do you think that GDP is lower in Atlantic Canada? • Does lower GDP always mean a lower quality of life? • Conference Board of Canada 2016 study

QUALITY OF LIFE

Some of the reasons for the disparity:

- Seasonal work workers are employed for a small part of the year
- Brain drain younger, better-educated workers out-migrate for higher-paying jobs
- Immigration few immigrants settle in Atlantic Canada; most head to Vancouver, Toronto, and Montreal

ATLANTIC CANADA: LOOKING FOR SOLUTIONS

- To ensure that important services such as health care and education are similar throughout the country, the Canadian government introduced transfer payments in 1957
- Provinces with high GDPs transfer some money collected through taxes to those with lower GDP
- ACOA Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency

THE IMPORTANCE OF TRADE

- Trading with other provinces/countries boosts the Atlantic Economy
- In 2010, \$2.5 billion of seafood products was exported
- Others include wood, pulp, and paper and other agri-food products (frozen potatoes make up 20% of food exports)
- Since 1950s, world trade patterns have been changing
- Free trade eliminates tariffs (taxes) on certain goods
- NAFTA North American Free Trade Agreement

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
